GENDERED EXCLUSION - HISTORY OF MARGINALITIES IN SEARCH OF A PARADIGM SHIFT: VOICES FROM ANTHROPOLOGY AND BEYOND IN SEARCH OF A PUBLIC METAPHOR

ABSTRACT

The fundamental premise of UIAF-WAC-23 is anthropology in public sphere: indigeneity, social justice, sustainability, and global peace. Just a cursory reading would suggest that it is an ambitious agenda and a tall order. The conversations that it proposes to generate are challenged by inequalities, warfare, economic crisis, and identity conundrum that draws its inspiration from narrow interpretations of religion, race, ethnicity, and vague notions of biological determinism. The pursuit of social justice must transcend to a paradigm shift that could challenge multiple narratives of exclusion. In each of these aspirational constructs, gendered exclusion acquires primacy of challenge because it addresses more than half of the humanity. In a report presented by IESOGI[1] to the 47th Human rights council in the 76th UN general assembly, this challenge is pithily summarised as: "strict gender norms are at the root of social inequality in all societies across the globe". Histories of marginalization and gendered exclusion revert to early phases of human civilization when sociality started defining specified roles. There is consensus that this marginalization was further accentuated during colonization that destroyed several precolonial notions of gender parity. Opposition to perceived notions of gender ideology or gender agenda, emanates from post-colonial desire from a section of the society to control. It also reflects on legalized state system's abject failure to thwart these attempts. This round table seeks to raise these concerns and discuss imperatives needed immediately for bringing about a paradigm shift to address gendered exclusion. Voices from different disciplines will come together to have a detailed discussion and develop interdisciplinary perspective on changes required in legal vision and communication strategies. To evolve a public metaphor of equality that removes tainted lenses and recognises power of marginalized gendered agencies is the call of the hour!
